#### Message from Len Schwartz, Greenhouse Director

Last month's lottery for open bench spaces went well. Very few of us wanted to change spots and we were able to accommodate those of us who did mostly with the spaces they preferred. Only one bench space remains unused at this time. The rules for bench use are:

- 1. If your plants interfere with the light reaching anyone other member's plants, then your plants are too high and must be lowered in height.
- 2. The ground under and near your bench must be kept clean and weed free
- 3. Your plants should not block the aisles
- 4. Any plants brought in to the greenhouse must be healthy and insect free. They must be sprayed and given a yellow seal of approval.

At the December 1st meeting the greenhouse committee passed a motion to eliminate section 4e from our by-laws. This section says "Greenhouse committee officers cannot hold the duplicate position in the Garden Club". A notice of this proposed change is posted in the greenhouse and is also being announced in this edition of the newsletter. A final vote on this amendment will take place at the January meeting. Elimination of section 4e and a similar action to the Garden Club by-laws is important if we are to move towards a goal of simplifying the Garden Club with one set of officers with one set of by-laws. I strongly encourage the passage of this amendment.

Hurricane Sandy knocked out power to the greenhouse for over a week and without electric power our gas fueled heating system does not work. If an extended outage were to occur during our plant growing period from February through April, we could lose some or all of our more temperature sensitive plants. The Greenhouse Committee Executive Board will be considering the costs of installing a gas fueled electric generator as a backup safety system. Len

We have completed our plans for the 2013 Plant Sale. I would like to thank all who participated in the selection process: Dania Cheddie, Pat Fromm, Jane Furman, Robyn Lowenthal, Christina Gels Mackensen, Cynthia McKay and Len Schwartz. We will continue to offer Impatiens and expanding our selections in Begonia, Coleus, Marigolds, Geranium and Petunia. We are introducing Verbena and Celosia as new products. We are also adding to our selection of herbs thyme, cilantro and oregano. We will also offer more peppers. We have been working closely with our Grower, Van Vugt who's Horticultural Director Kevin Penning has provided invaluable information about greenhouse plant propagation, plant selection, fertilization, watering and lighting requirements as well as confirming our ready for sale dates. He noted that all plants are not created equal: each have special watering, heat, light and fertilization needs. Upon his recommendation we have purchased Ball Redbook Greenhouse Equipment and Crop Production, the bible in Greenhouse parlance. We will contact all the Group leaders to discuss the plant flow, transplanting and growing requirements. Joe

#### Leaves as Mulch.

The longer I garden, the greater my appreciation for the value of organic matter. One of the very best sources of organic matter is autumn leaves. Leaves are packed with trace minerals that trees draw up from deep in the soil. When added to your garden, leaves feed earthworms and beneficial microbes. They lighten heavy soils and help sandy soils retain moisture. They make good mulch in the flower garden, are a fabulous source of carbon to balance the nitrogen in your compost pile, and will insulate tender plants from cold. *Pat*

#### Where Did Impatiens Come From? By Sara Jones

Impatiens are one of the few plants whose botanical name is also its common name, which alludes to the way the seedpods shatter when touched, scattering seeds up to several feet away. Most hybrids don't bear seeds, but the old fashioned Balsam or Bizzy Lizzy Impatiens can still be found in many cottage gardens, coming up year after year. Impatiens originated from east Africa. The modern bedding hybrids are derived from plants first named for the Sultan of Zanzibar (Impatiens Sultana) and later changed to impatiens Wallerana to honor Horace Waller, a British Many Impatiens naturalized in missionary. Central and South America after arriving on trading ships from Africa. In 1970 a team of USDA botanists in Papua, New Guinea discovered an impatiens species with large flowers and variegated foliage. Working in conjunction with Longwood Gardens in Pennsylvania, they produced what is now known as New Guinea Impatiens. Sara
