Message from Len Schwartz, Greenhouse Director

As the winter starts to end, the conditions in the greenhouse will be changing radically

from day to night to day with temperatures spiking on warmer sunny days. We have already registered 90 plus degrees on Feb. 22 and 23. When this happens the louvers at the top of the greenhouse should be opened manually to bring the temperature down. They must be manually closed again later that same day to maintain our minimum temperatures during the much colder nights. Joe Papa has released a first round of parasitic wasps, which we expect, will control our white fly problems again this year. We wish our wasps good eating. We are in the beginning of preparing for our plant sale and for the start of the expanded Hawthorn School Program. They are both major programs of the Greenhouse Committee and will need our full support.

Message from Joe Papa, Greenhouse Horticultural Director

As the snow melted this week my thoughts gravitated to the return of the sun, its warmth and renewal. As of this posting we are approximately 20 days from the Vernal Equinox. Bird migrations begin to coincide with the renewal of plant and insect life. I am anxious to see the rebirth of our newly planted Insectary on the north fence of the vegetable gardens, as it renews it will become a haven for many of the beneficial insects that have overwintered and sustain them until the populations of pests which they prey on begin to emerge. Minute Pirate bugs (*Orius Insidiosus*), Lady Bugs (*Hippodamia Convergens*), parasitic wasps (*Encarsia Formosa*) to name but a few. There are a host of beneficial insects like pollinators as well as those that prey on many of the pests that plague us in the greenhouse, homes and our gardens. They have evolved in conjunction with the pests and their numbers control and hinder pest populations, all naturally. We as a species during our early agrarian periods had always

maintained this symbiotic relationship with nature, always having great respect for the land and all of its resources. As our populations exploded beyond the capabilities of the land to sustain we too became vulnerable to the imbalances created. Our gardens are microcosms of the greater nature, vulnerable to its vicissitudes and beneficiaries of its bounty. Enjoy the challenge, enjoy the wonder, enjoy the flow of life, enjoy the spring. Joe

Spring Garden Trip By Robyn Lowenthal

Spring must be coming sometime soon. So let's make plans to go out and see some gardens. Please join members of the Garden Club of Teaneck for a tour of Rutgers Gardens on Wednesday, May 28, 2014. The tour will be led by Bruce Crawford, director of Rutgers Gardens.

Rutgers Gardens is comprised of a series of horticultural collections arranged in garden settings and spread over fifty acres. These collections and garden areas, the oldest of which dates back to 1927, feature a diverse variety of landscape plants with origins that span the globe. We will be able to see and learn different methods of combining plants that will provide four seasons of color, texture and form. On our tour through the Garden, we will see the perennial and annual

gardens, featuring All America Selections® flower and vegetable winners, one of the largest collections of American Hollies in the US, the Shrub Garden, a Rhododendron and Azalea Garden, the Evergreen Collection, a Water Conservation Garden, The Gardens for Sun & Shade, and a Bamboo forest. In addition, we will visit the field trials, where Rutgers does comparisons of various cultivars to see which do best in the growing conditions of central New Jersey. In accordance with the Garden's mission to promote and provide accurate information about the art of horticulture with an emphasis upon the relationship between plants, human health and nutrition in designed and natural landscapes, our tour will include the ethno-botanical and anthropological connection between plants and people.

The cost of the tour is \$10.00 per person. Plan to bring your lunch, as we will be able to picnic on the Garden grounds. We will be leaving the Greenhouse around 9:30 AM. Our tour will last about two hours. The tour is limited to 20 people, so please contact Robyn Lowenthal at 201-287-1970 or Catboat3@gmail.com, by May 20, if you would like to join us. Help Wanted

The following is an appeal from our President for help:

A senior facility in Closter houses approximately 65 developmentally disabled adults the clients /patients who live at this site and call it "home". Most are confined to a wheelchair and live here because they require medical supervision around the clock. However, they thoroughly enjoy gardening and doing so gives them a sense of pride and builds self esteem.

The facility has a 12'X18' greenhouse attached off of the recreation room. In addition, 2 portable wheelchair accessible horticulture working stations and a 4 tier shelf with lights are available for the program. Money has been allocated in the budget for this program. The money can be used for seeds, pots, soil or anything else necessary to make this program successful.

The program did have a horticulturist who headed up this program until a couple of months ago. He had to relocate and unfortunately he could no longer help run the program. There are 2 full time recreation staff available to assist in carrying out this program. Also, there are 5 – 8 direct care staff to assist as well. What is sorely missing from this program is a person with the knowledge, expertise and heart to help bring it back to life.

The director suggests one hour per week but is flexible and will offer a small salary for the right person. If you have questions or would like more details, please call Pat Fromm at 201-880-1660.
