#### Message from Len Schwartz, Greenhouse Director

The final preparations for our sale are being completed; we are in the busiest time of our year. The Plant Sale times are:

> Saturday, May  $27^{th}$  9 AM to 3 PM Sunday, May  $28^{th}$  9 AM until 3 PM Monday, May  $29^{th}$  9 AM to 12 noon Tuesday, May  $30^{th}$  5 PM to 8 PM Wednesday, May  $1^{st}$  9 AM to 12 noon Thursday, May  $2^{nd}$  5 PM to 8 PM Friday, May  $3^{rd}$  5 PM to 8 PM Saturday May  $4^{th}$  9 AM until 3 PM Sunday May  $5^{th}$  9 AM until 3 PM

Almost everyone has signed up for their two weekend assignments. You are also responsible one midweek for attending assignment preferably with your regular group. This Friday, April 26 we will hold our members only pre-sale from 5 PM to 8 PM. We will be selling our plants to ourselves in recognition of all the hard word we put in. The prices are not discounted, but we will have first choice. This is the only opportunity for members to obtain plants before the sale starts. No one will be allowed to remove plants or to put them on their bench before Friday evening. Our final meeting and celebration for the season will be on Saturday, May 18 at 10 AM and not on June 1 as formally planned. We will be evaluating how the year went, eating enough sweets to drive us all into diabetic comas, and giving away all unsold plants to the members present at the meeting. No unsold plants may be removed or claimed until May 18. Our new mini and micro outside gardens are being completed and a new bed along the fence is being planted with native plants that will attract beneficial insects. Len

#### Message from Joe Papa -Horticulture Director

As you know edible gardeners are always challenged by pests who attack our plants. Utilizing composting techniques we enable strong plants and their ability to fend off these pests but often this is not enough. To augment our defenses against these pests, we have to attract beneficial insects into our growing environment. We want to attract those insects that prey on the bad guys if you will. Each beneficial insect has different requirements in terms of plants they can feed on when the pests they prey on are in short supply. The type of plant, timing of bloom, shelter and nectar of the plants provide varies. For example, the minute pirate bug (scientific name: Orius Hemiptera) emerges in early spring and preys on aphids and needs early season pollen and nectar to survive. If we introduce cilantro, sweet alyssum and other early bloomers, it will suffice until the pest population grows. This spring we will be integrating these Insectary areas throughout the periphery of our growing areas to not only encourage our pollinators but to provide a home and haven to other beneficial insects.

At this stage we are into full swing planting and transplanting some early lettuce and arugula. I have planted beets, carrots and will be planting beans successively (to maximize yield). I will plant Okra (beautiful flowers) as well and two varieties of Korean squash. I have a little planting spreadsheet that does all the calculations for you. #### **Grafted Tomatoes By Sara Jones**

This year grafted tomatoes can be purchased in your local garden stores. Some of the ones I like best are the Grafted Black Krim heirloom, Grafted Brandywine, Cherokee Purple and the Rose heirloom. These tomatoes are said to be more productive and proven to produce 50% or more fruit and are resistant to soil borne pests. Grafted plants are more expensive than traditionally grown tomatoes; they may be twice the cost. I do plan to try at least 4 plants to see for myself.
