Our MEMBERS ONLY pre-sale is from 5 to 8 pm on Thursday, May 4 ONLY. No one is allowed to buy or remove sale plants before that date nor on Friday, May 5th. In Kind Remembrance: Helen Humphreys

Helen Humphreys passed away on Saturday, April 21st, 2017. She had been a member of the Garden Club of Teaneck since 1990.

Everyone knew Helen--she was the Membership Chair who recruited new members in the supermarket. As Coordinator of the Hawthorne School program, she developed lessons for "garbage gardening" that were unique, saying: "Don't throw it--grow it!" Helen also represented our Club in the Teaneck High School Scholarship Program for many years.

She gave this interview for the Newsletter in March 2009.



Interview: Helen Humphreys, Coordinator, Greenhouse Children's Program

...Your gardening--early history? Helen always had a green thumb, "ever since I was about 3 feet tall." Window sill gardening and weeding were her specialties---as was following her curiosity about all unusual plants. "You don't find philodendron at my bench!"

...History of the program? Lou Schwartz started the Hawthorne program in the early '80s, going to classrooms to see the children. Helen started as a teacher in the program in 1995-96.

Her interest in "garbage gardening" is one of the many things she has learned about plants. "You don't stop learning--it goes on all through life. I'm not a rocking-chair and TV person."

...Plants used in garbage gardening?

Helen used all kinds of plant seeds and roots to generate whole flowering and fruit-bearing plants. A gift of a coffee tree resulted in coffee beans, green, yellow and red ones. Avocado pits, ginger roots, pineapple tops, and ugly fruit seeds have all resulted in plants.

...A story about the children?

"A boy frantically looked around the table of plants for students and said, 'Last year you had it--this year you don't. Something to do with *canine*' I said, *Coleus canina*! So, I gave him two cuttings."

...Plants the children buy?

"The children buy 3 or 4 plants, something with bright colors, anything with flowers. I try to have something besides Anglo-Saxon plants--Cuban oregano, for instance."

...Tip for beginning teachers?

"You can't do it well unless you do it your own way."

...What motivates you the most?

"Children are wonderful and that's what I like."
